

Psychology Post-doctoral Fellowship (2 positions)

The following positions require completion of a doctoral degree (Ph.D. or Psy.D.) in Professional Psychology (i.e., Clinical, Counseling, Forensic, or School)

1. Forensic Unit

This position is assessment-focused and involves conducting psychological evaluations for youth who are involved in the Juvenile Justice System. The forensic evaluation consists of conducting a comprehensive clinical interview, obtaining collateral information, and administering and interpreting objective and projective assessment measures. Psychological reports are written in a timely manner, as they are utilized by the Juvenile Court System. The reports should demonstrate strong case conceptualization skills, accurate DSM diagnoses, and appropriate clinical recommendations. The purpose of these evaluations vary, but might involve diagnostic clarification, determining level of intellectual functioning, making appropriate placement or treatment recommendations, or evaluating youth who are being considered for a waiver of the juvenile jurisdiction and possibly transferred into the adult criminal court system. The position involves effective interaction with judges, attorney, and other court staff in the collection of information and collaboration on assigned cases. It is also expected that this individual will participate and provide clinical input in multidisciplinary case staffings and will participate in case consultations and training opportunities provided by the department. The post-doctoral resident will receive supervision from a licensed psychologist and will provide supervision to psychology practicum students and doctoral interns. It is also expected that this individual will provide related mental health training/education as needed within the agency and in the community.

2. TRIAD Prevention Program

The TRIAD Prevention Program is a consortium of three county agencies (Harris County Protective Services for Children and Adults, Harris County Juvenile Probation and The Harris Center for Mental Health and IDD) working together to coordinate their resources to serve youth who are at-risk. TRIAD provides countywide prevention and early intervention services to divert youth and families from involvement with the Children's Protective Services, mental health and/or juvenile justice systems. TRIAD provides crisis intervention services to families presenting with issues of runaway, truancy, or family conflict. All services are free and crisis intervention services are available 24 hours a day, on a walk-in basis.

The target population served by this post-doctoral position will be at-risk adolescents, many of whom are currently involved in multiple systems, but continue to exhibit emotional and behavioral difficulties at home, school, and in the community. While such individuals often present with issues of family conflict, there is also frequently a history of underlying trauma and instability with these youth. Many of these adolescents are currently residing in a 30-day emergency shelter while the youth and their families are assessed. The goal is to assist the family in determining what available services are most appropriate to meet their needs and resolve their problems. A large

percentage of the post-doc's time will be devoted to completing psychological evaluations for these youth. The evaluations consist of conducting a comprehensive clinical interview, obtaining collateral information, and administering and interpreting objective and projective assessment measures. Psychological reports are written in a timely manner, as they are utilized by the various systems involved with the child. In addition, the post doc will conduct group therapy, brief individual therapy, and address crisis situations in the emergency shelter as needed. The post doc will also participate in interdisciplinary consultation meetings regarding these youth.

Both positions require a Ph.D/Psy.D. from an accredited college or university in professional psychology (i.e., Clinical, Counseling, Forensic, School). APA-accredited graduate programs and internships are preferred, but not required. These positions will begin on September 1, 2017 and end on August 31, 2018. Post-doctoral fellows are full-time employees of Harris County and they are eligible to begin receiving benefits (medical, dental, and vision insurance) 60 days after employment begins. All Harris County employees contribute to the Texas County and District Retirement System. Employees earn sick leave, vacation time, and have 10 holidays plus one floating holiday. The salary is \$44,200 for the upcoming year.

This is a preliminary application and the top candidates will be asked to submit a formal application through Harris County. More information will be given to qualified candidates regarding this next step as it becomes available. Individuals who are selected for this position must successfully complete a criminal background check (no felonies within 10 years and no misdemeanors within 5 years), a check through the Department of Family and Protective Services, and a drug test.
