## **2015 Year End Summary Brief**

In 2015, the department received 12,249 referrals, averaging 1,021 referrals per month, which involved 7,370 youth. A small decline in referral activity was noted when compared to 2014 data (-1.9%). Decreases were found for burglary (-23.9%), and in both classifications of theft: felony theft (-23.6%), misdemeanor A/B theft (-10.7%), and drugs: felony drugs (-12.1%), misdemeanor A/B drugs (-17.5%). Both felony and misdemeanor A/B assault increased 18.6% and 10.5% respectively. Likewise, felony mischief rose 11.3% while misdemeanor A/B mischief rose 8.0%. Growth was also observed for misdemeanor A/B other offenses (26.9%), along with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle (21.5%) and arson (9.3%).

Felony referrals comprised 17.3% of the total referred, the largest increase in more than 12 years. The felony offense categories contributing to this significant upturn include auto theft (63.2%), evade/resist arrest (58.0%), and robberies (33.7%). Robberies went from 326 in 2014 to 436 in 2015. Felony crimes against property fell by 9.5%, whereas felony crimes against persons grew by 162 offenses (23.8%). For the first time in six years, the top 10 felonies and misdemeanor offenses both experienced an increase over the previous year at 7.9% and 8.9% respectively. There were six African-American and one Hispanic male charged with homicide in 2015, averaging 16 years of age. Of these seven referrals for murder, there were five actual deaths.

Petitions filed rose slightly by 1.0%, from 9,365 in 2014 to 9,459 in 2015, while representative youth remained relatively stable from the previous year. The department experienced a sizeable increase (76.5%) of youth committed to TJJD from 102 in 2014 to 180 in 2015. The juvenile courts certified 28 youth in 2015 and denied certification for 36 juveniles. This represents a 17.6% decrease of youth certified from the previous year. Total youth assigned supervision declined 3.2% along with the 8.2% reduction in the monthly average of specialized supervision caseloads.

Youth placed in Harris County Juvenile post-adjudicated facilities fell slightly by 2.1%, while a higher decrease was shown in private placements (-15.2%). There was a decline of 8.4% in youth admitted to the Juvenile Justice Center's detention facility from 2,888 in 2014 down to 2,646 in 2015. Despite this drop in admissions, the average daily population of the detention facility rose to 255, an increase from the average daily population of 213 in 2014.






Charges Received as Compared to Youth Involved  
January-December 2013-2015




Delinquent Conduct Referrals







The following table presents a comparison of **January-December 2014** referral activity as contrasted to **January-December 2015** referral activity. During this month, the data shows an overall 1.9% decrease in referral activity. Despite this decrease, increases are found for Auto Theft (63.2%), Felony Evade/Resisting Arrest (58.0%), Robbery (33.7%), and Misdemeanor A/B Other (26.9%). Several decreases include Burglary (-23.9%), Felony Theft (-23.6%), Misdemeanor A/B Drugs (-17.5%), and Homicide (-12.5%). Less serious offenses decreased by 4.6%.

**There were 7 referrals\* for homicide during January-December 2015, compared to 8 for the same time period of 2014.**


